Opinion

We have audited the accompanying Statement of consolidated financial results of Shree Pushkar Chemicals & Fertilisers Limited ("the Parent Company") and its subsidiaries (the Parent Company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the Group") for the quarter and year ended March 31, 2023 ("the Statement"), attached herewith, being submitted by the Parent Company pursuant to the requirements of Regulation 33 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 as amended ("the Regulation").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the Statement:

- i. includes the results of the following subsidiaries
- Kisan Phosphates Private Limited
- Madhya Bharat Phosphate Private Limited
- ii. is presented in accordance with the requirements of Regulation in this regard; and
- iii. gives a true and fair view in conformity with the recognition and measurement principles laid down in the applicable Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the consolidated net profit and total comprehensive income and other financial information of the Group for the guarter and year ended March 31, 2023.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013, as amended ("the Act"). Our responsibilities under those SAs are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Results section of our report. 1 The above audited consolidated financial results of the Group for the quarter and year ended March 31, 2023 were reviewed by the Audit Committee and thereafter approved by the Board of Directors in their meeting held on May 16, 2023. The Statutory Auditors have audited these financial results for the quarter and year ended March 31, 2023 and have issued an unmodified report on these results.

2 This statement has been prepared in accordance with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (Ind AS) prescribed under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 and other recognised accounting practices and policies to the extent applicable.

3 The members of the Holding company approved the issue of 7,89,473 warrants convertible into equity shares, for cash, at an issue price of Rs.190/- per warrant to the promoter of the Holding Company by passing a Special Resolution at the Extra Ordinary General Meeting held on July 5, 2021. The Holding Company had received In-principle approval from both the Stock Exchanges on August 20, 2021 and the board of directors approved the allotment on August 28, 2021 by passing resolution by circulation under section 175 of the Companies Act, 2013. The Holding Company had received Rs. 375.00 lakhs on August 27, 2021 towards twenty five percent of the total consideration and Rs.1125.00 lakhs on June 6, 2022 towards the balance amount against the allotment of equity shares up on conversion of warrants. Accordingly, the Holding company has allotted these equity shares on June 6, 2022 to the Promoter of the Holding Company. The necessary corporate actions with depositories and Listing approvals from Stock Exchanges were obtained.

4 The Group is engaged in manufacture of Chemicals & Fertilisers, consequently the Company does not have separate reportable business segment for quarter and year ended March 31, 2023.

5 Figures for the quarter ended March 31, 2023 and March 31, 2022 as reported in these financial results, are the balancing figures between audited figures in respect of full financial years and the published year to date figures up to the end of the third quarter of the respective financial year.

6 Figures relating to the previous period(s) / year have been regrouped / rearranged, wherever necessary, to make them comparable with those of the current period.

Accordingly, the company has allotted these equity shares on June 6, 2022 to the Promoter of the Company. The necessary corporate actions with depositories and Listing approvals from Stock Exchanges were obtained.
